## From the Principal's Desk...



Our VCAL students and staff are presently enjoying well earned praise and recognition after another very successful Camperdown College Mow Down on Saturday. The VCAL team worked hard to ensure that the event was enjoyable, safe and memorable for participants and spectators alike. The students' diligence, teamwork and maturity was widely noted and

appreciated, with allocated duties performed ably and with pride. An event on this scale is not possible without high level coordination and leadership and I am deeply appreciative of the efforts and organisational skills of teachers Sue Maskell, Warren Attrill, Chris Brooks and Jesse Van, supported by many other staff, parent and student helpers. It was terrific to have the involvement and assistance of past students of the College, including Declan Lown who once again proved to be a capable race starter and official.

We are very grateful to our Parents & Friends who worked tirelessly to provide refreshments, support our students and raise valuable funds for the College. Many thanks also to the parents and family members who baked for the cake stall, and to the wider community for generous sponsorship and support of this event. Competitors for the various classes came from far afield and we were particularly proud of current Year 12 student Beau Parlour on his Camperdown College Cup win!

Our Year 12 VCE students commenced their final exam period yesterday morning, completing the English exam in the AG Daws Hall. Whilst formal classes finished last week, Year 12 teachers are welcoming the opportunity to work closely with those students who are visiting the school regularly to seek feedback on their responses to practice exam questions. This close teaching and learning partnership means that students can continue to refine their understanding and hone their exam response techniques, positioning them well to demonstrate their skills and knowledge to the highest possible standard. All Year 12 VCE students should be taking full advantage of this tailored support and I wish them every success in this final stage of their VCE.

Unfortunately we did not have sufficient interest to proceed with last week's planned information session for a 2019 Study Tour to Indonesia. This immersion experience for our Year 9 – 11 students is intended to run every second year and participation was strong in 2015 and 2017. The trip incorporates a visit to our sister school in West Java and the opportunity to experience Javanese and Balinese culture first hand. Students are encouraged to consider this opportunity next year for 2020.

Current Year 8 students received information this week regarding the School for Student Leadership. Our application to send a team of six Year 9 students to this residential program in 2019 was successful and expressions of interest are now invited for Term 2 at the Alpine Campus, Dinner Plain. Camperdown College has enjoyed a long association with the SSL and we are thrilled to once again be able to offer this leadership development experience to our students. The cost to families for this nine week experience is very reasonable, heavily subsidised by the Department of Education and our School Council. All students are encouraged to give careful consideration to the opportunity, with expressions of interest due next Friday 9<sup>th</sup> November. Parents are welcome to contact me with any questions.

Thank you to parents who completed this year's Parent Opinion Survey commissioned by the Department of Education. A summary of the responses appears in this week's newsletter and the detailed data and written responses will inform ongoing reflection and future planning. The strong home-school partnership that we value so highly is reflected in the positive POS data.

For two years now we have been using Compass as a tool to support communication and reporting. It is important that we have accurate and first-hand information about parents' experiences of Compass so that this can be considered alongside student and teacher perspectives. In this newsletter you will find a Compass feedback sheet and you will see that the questions focus on the use of Compass to provide information about student learning. Feedback from Junior and Senior Campus families would be greatly appreciated by Friday 16<sup>th</sup> November.

Teaching staff will use Monday's professional development day to explore 'academic vocabulary' as a key driver for improvement. Since 2015, our teachers have collaboratively developed and refined Learning Cycles that support students to achieve agreed priority standards from the Victorian Curriculum. The next level of work is to identify and explicitly teach the vocabulary that will enable all students to understand key concepts and demonstrate their knowledge. Having all of our P-12 teaching staff together on Monday enables us to build a school-wide strategy and cohesive implementation plan for 2019 and beyond. The sharing of expertise across subject areas and year levels provides a rich environment for teacher learning.

I trust that students, parents and staff will enjoy Tuesday's Melbourne Cup public holiday. Our school roses are bursting into bloom in honour of the big event!

Likewise students who don't have an exam in the afternoon are permitted to study at home. **ALL students** are to remain in the examination room until the allotted time has passed. Students have been given a copy of their exam timetable.

Year 9/10 students will be attending the performance of *You the Man* along with students from district secondary schools at the Camperdown Theatre on Tuesday 27<sup>th</sup> November. ## CHEESY CRUST PIZZA

MAKES 10

PREP 15 mins

COOK 10 mins

### INGREDIENTS

2 cups plain flour  
8g dry yeast  
1 tsp caster sugar  
1/2 tsp salt  
2 tbsp olive oil  
200ml lukewarm water  
1 tbsp garlic  
1/3 cup tomato paste  
1 cup Great Ocean Road Colby Cheese, grated  
Plus your favourite toppings

### METHOD

1. Combine dry ingredients in a large mixing bowl & add oil & water. Turn oven on to 190°C. Mix to a soft dough. Knead on a floured surface until elastic & springy. Return to the mixing bowl & cover with cling wrap & leave in a warm spot for 30 mins. The dough should double in size.
2. Once it has risen, 'punch' the dough once to remove any air bubbles. Remove from the bowl & knead gently for 1min. Roll the dough out to desired size.
3. Place the grated Colby cheese around edges & fold dough over it. Mix garlic with tomato paste & spread all over base. Add favorite toppings. Put in oven for 10 mins, then enjoy.

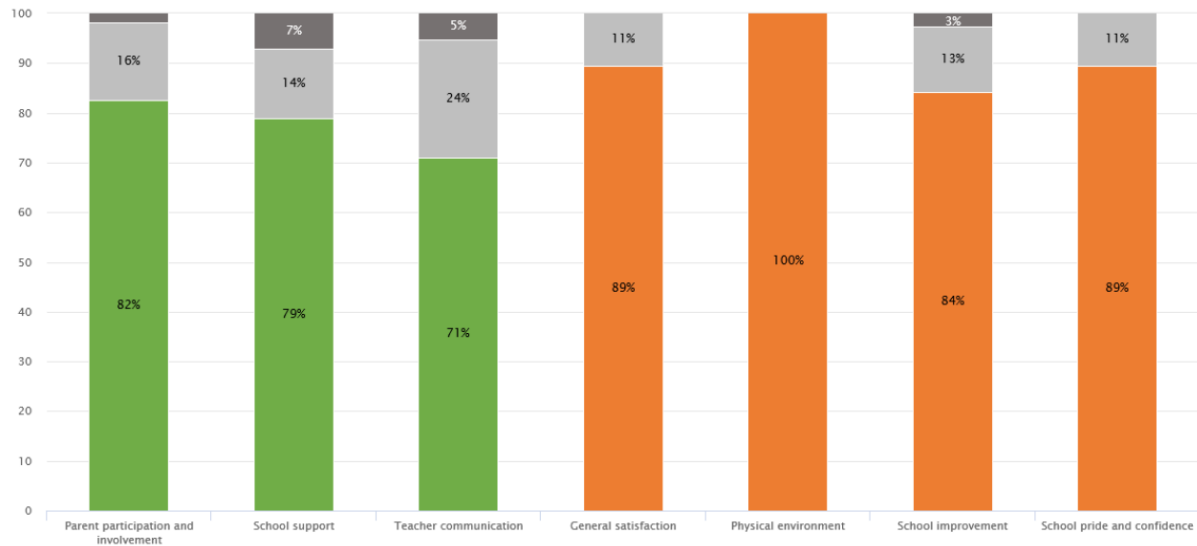

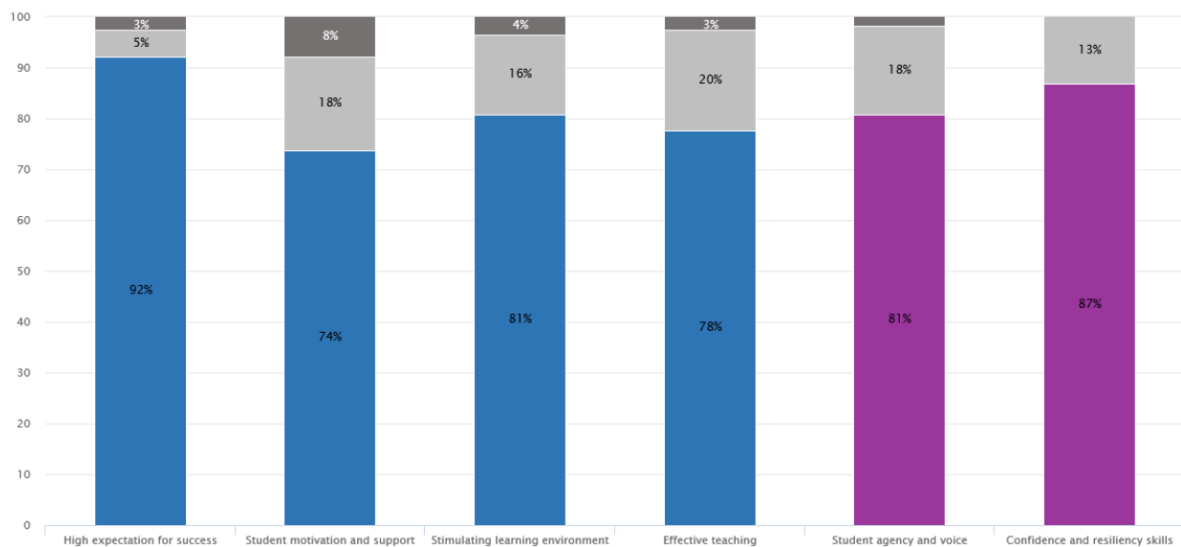
## Parent Opinion Survey Results: Affirming our Mission and Vision

Key: colour = positive endorsement, grey = neutral endorsement, dark grey = negative endorsement

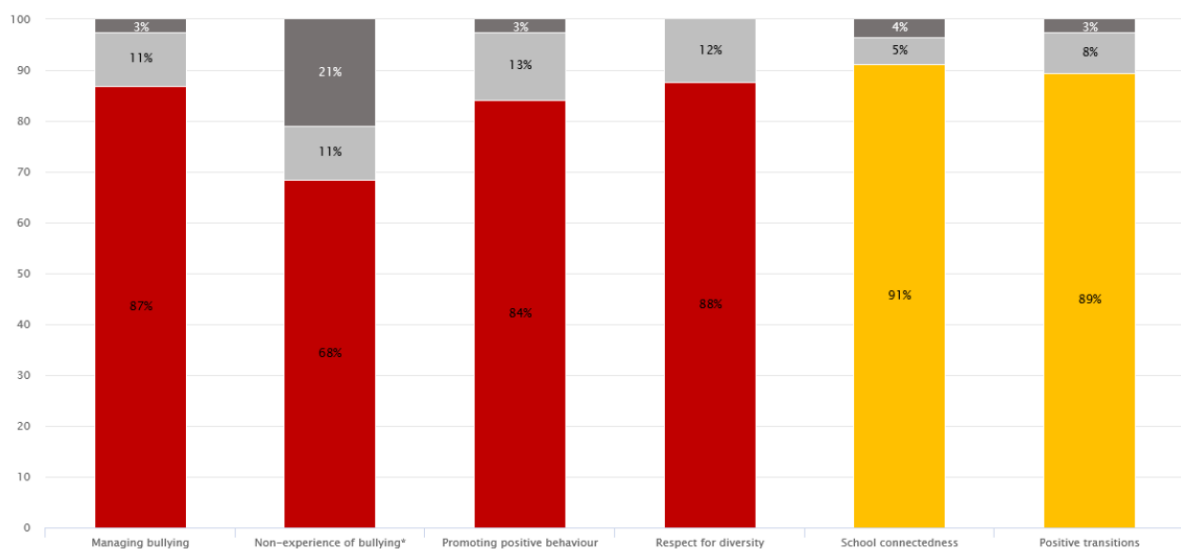
